RULES AND REGULATION 2005-2006

Page 61 – The member school with which the individual is associated may be subject to disciplinary action if it is found that the member school’s policies, actions or failure to act, substantially contributed to the individual’s conduct.

Unsportsmanlike conduct shall include but not be limited to the following:

Any person (Athletic Department, staff member, student-athlete or a fan or spectator associated with a member school)

Not permitted by code

- No physical abuse to officials, coaches, players or spectators
- No inciting, violent or abusive action
- No use of obscene gestures or profane or unduly provocative language or actions towards officials, opponents or spectators

The administration of a member school will be responsible for the unsportsman like conduct of that school’s fans or spectators.

DISORDERLY PERSONS STATUTE

2c:33-2

Disorderly Conduct

- Improper Behavior.** A person is guilty of petty disorderly persons offense if with purpose to cause public inconvenience, annoyance or alarm, or recklessly creating a risk thereof he (1) Engages in fighting or threatening, or in violent or tumultuous behavior; or (2) Creates a hazardous or physically dangerous condition by any act which serves no legitimate purpose of the actor.
- Offensive Language.** A person is guilty of a petty disorderly persons offense if in a public place, and with purpose to offend the sensibilities of a hearer or in reckless disregard of the probability of doing so, he addresses unreasonably loud and offensively coarse or abusive language, given the circumstances of the person present.

“Public” means affecting or likely to affect persons in a place to which the public or a substantial group has access; among the places included are highways, transport facilities, schools, prisons, apartment houses, places of business or amusement, or any neighborhood.
